FOR THE THIRD YEAR, *Crain's* is featuring the Coolest Offices in New York. To be eligible, offices needed to have been opened, renovated or modified between Jan. 1, 2019, and March 31, 2020. Although the pandemic has put office life on pause, there is reason to believe that workers will start returning to their old workplaces sometime next year. Judging was done by *Crain's* editorial staff based on surveys, descriptions and photos. Fifteen finalists were selected in five categories: amenities, collaborative space, new construction, retrofit and views.

Ted Moudis Associates designed a multipurpose boardroom adjacent to an open-plan amphitheater that can be reconfigured into a large town hall space for client events.

1 LIBERTY PLAZA, Financial District

The MKDA-designed office has a corridor of collaborative spaces through the center core, including a kitchen, library, den, workroom, living room and community hub with an 1,800-square-foot cafe.



31 HUDSON YARDS, Hudson Yards

A metal staircase, haloed by a custom, modern chandelier, unifies the bi-level space and is intended to be a show-stopping element.





1185 AVENUE OF THE AMERICAS, Midtown

This M.S. Architecture-designed office has a 20-person boardroom with an 18-foot black table, surrounded with authentic reclaimed New York brick and reclaimed barnboard.



605 THIRD AVE., Murray Hill

At 40 stories high, the TPG Architecture-designed office offers views looking south of the Freedom Tower and the Verrazzano-Narrrows Bridge or closeups of the Chrysler and Empire State buildings.

The advertising agency's office, designed by TPG Architecture, is fitted with a variety of support and amenity spaces, including huddle rooms, a photo studio, an editing suite and a fitness center.



32 OLD SLIP, Financial District

Half of the seventh floor was gutted to make way for this Spector Group-designed office. Floor-to-ceiling windows offer unobstructed views from every desk of famous East River bridges and ferries.

Bar Deco sits high on the 41st floor, a space that is multifunctional where meetings are held, ideas transpire, meals are shared, cocktails poured, and moments celebrated.

The rooftop is the star of this PR software company's seventh-floor office, offering panoramic views of both the Freedom Tower and Empire State Building.
